

Guest Speakers, Chief Leah Stump and Chad Stump, shared their perspectives on the impact of the Indian Act and Indian Residential Schools with grade 9 students in POD 1.



To honour Truth & Reconciliation the QJS P.E. dept. taught their students about the difficult challenges faced by Indigenous Peoples across Canada and then played three Indigenous games: Run & Scream, Tatanka, and Sticks. These games were traditionally played to teach Indigenous youth essential survival skills and were very popular with QJS students!



Literature has a powerful impact. QJS students read various stories, for example, *I am Not a Number* by Jenny Kay Dupuis, and *A Secret Path* by Gord Downie, both inspired writing and reflections by students.

Every September 30th we wear orange shirts to honour residential school survivors. Orange Shirt Day grew out of Phyllis Webstad's story of having her shiny new orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at residential school told for the first time May 2013. Phyllis published her first children's book Orange Shirt Day which aims to bring communities together.

Phyllis' latest book "Beyond the Orange Short Story" is a unique collection of truths that articulate the lives and experiences of some Residential School Survivors and their families. Compiled by Phyllis Webstad, Residential School Survivor and Founder of the Orange Shirt Day movement, this book will give readers an up-close look at what life was like for many Survivors — before, during, and after their Residential School experiences. These personal Survivor accounts, relayed in a number of one-on-one interviews, are authentically shared in their own voices.
